- Encouraging the federal government to enforce existing animal protection laws.
- Nurturing the future of animal law through student chapters.
- Providing public education through seminars, workshops and other outreach efforts.

HSUS is the nation's largest animal protection organization in the U.S.. Established in 1954, the organization's Web site says it is "America's mainstream force against cruelty, exploitation and neglect, as well as the most trusted voice extolling the human-animal bond."

HSUS is active with campaigns and issues, including:

- Animal experimentation: biomedical research, medical training using animals, cosmetic and product testing
- Animal fighting: dog fighting and cockfighting
- Equine protection: horse slaughter, homeless horses, wild horses, Tennessee Walking Horse
- Factory farming: gestation crates for sows, battery cages for laying hens, tail docking of cattle
- Pet protection: animal neglect & abuse, chaining and tethering, puppy mills, overpopulation

Developed for the Center for Consumer Freedom, Humane Watch's primary focus is that of a "watchdog" of the Humane Society of the United States. It has placed advertisements in the New York Times and other publication, criticizing HSUS for spending 1% of its budget on shelter programs, while instead, as it contends, allocating the majority of its time and resources on fundraising, lobbying and marketing.

The Web site is a compilation of articles, blogs, etc. that takes a look at – and challenges – HSUS.
